GOOD SPORT NEW CLUB OF THE YEAR

Kofukan Karate Australia won the 2022 National Good Sport New Club of the Year award. This recognises that, after joining Good Sports in August 2022, Kofukan Karate Australia had achieved the highest level of the program (Gold Medal accreditation) and implemented a range of policies and resources to support members.

Unified study of Kofukan Shito-ryu Karate-do

One of the first tasks we set ourselves was to define a fairer, transparent, and consistent method of assessing students at panel gradings. This may or may not need adjusting in the future, however the feedback from students and instructors has been positive. This new method gives our students a concise snapshot of their strengths and weakness, and it safeguards our style giving more definition to our standards whilst maintaining our international scope set by the heads of Kofukan.

Thanks to the hard work of Lindon McKenna, students can study at home through our Australian Kofukan website. Our website has an international following and has set the standard for improved communications and shared training worldwide.

Brown belt and Shodan training seminars held throughout the year provide us with a definitive pathway moving forward. We come together to discuss, collaborate, and simply have fun. Out of all the events held throughout the year the brown and blackbelt seminars are most important for upholding the integrity of our style.

Collaboration between dojos

Joint social events are encouraged throughout the metro area. A club that only offers karate classes gets boring especially for children. In 2022, we invited all members to a movie night and to beach training. We should all aim to improve how we run our dojos and look to provide opportunities to add more substance for our members and their families: e.g., BBQs, hiking, fun runs for charities, movie nights, and adult events.

Support and develop members in sport karate

When it comes to tournaments, you have to be in it to win it. But it is not that easy and we need to provide our members with more opportunities for success. At the beginning of 2022, Kalgoorlie dojo hosted a WA Karate Federation (WAKF) tournament seminar, which was very informative for students and instructors. My Karate For Life club has hosted instructors with extensive tournament experience, to the benefit of all attending. We should endeavour to give all Kofukan members this exposure.

Discussions have been held amongst our own ranks and in the future we wish to encourage students, parents, and instructors to become accredited officials and or referees with the WAKF.

Engagement with WA Karate Federation

Brian Chambers and myself attended the WAKF's 2022 AGM, which was followed by a head of style meeting. This was very insightful and left us both feeling that we should investigate more into how we use the support and resources offered by the WAKF to improve Kofukan Australia e.g. hosting accredited tournaments.



Fundraising

We started fundraising in July 2022 and have raised a substantial amount so far. I cannot thank you enough it has been a huge effort by all concerned.

Our fundraising push has been prompted by the desire to host a Kofukan International Cub tournament in the future. This involves many steps and a lot of money. I would like the committee to talk about involving our parents to help more and maybe appoint a sub-committee to take the lead with raising the required funds. I have been in discussions with Containers for Change about an exciting new way to fundraise using recycled containers.

Good Sports

In August 2022, we joined Good Sports, Australia's largest community health sport program run by the Alcohol and Drug Foundation (ADF). The Good Sports program supports and inspires sporting clubs to set up a better environment for members, volunteers, supporters and officials, helping tackle topics such as alcohol, drugs, smoking, mental health and safe transport.

What a wonderful surprise it was to be awarded something none of us saw coming, Good Sports New Club of the Year (National)! Well done and what a positive

way to start our second year of Kofukan Australia it reinforces our passion to deliver a healthy safe environment for all our members. Thank you to the other Principal Instructors: Iain Humphreys, Dave Hatte, and Brian Chambers for supporting this endeavour and achieving Good Sports accreditation for their clubs, and a huge thankyou to Lindon well done you are a huge inspiration to us all.

Events held in 2022

Brown belt workshops

Kofukan Karate Australia held four workshops for brown belts, in February, May, July and October. The workshops usually focus on grading requirements for 2nd Kyu, 1st Kyu and 1st Dan black belt, such as kata, fighting combinations and bunkai.



Panel gradings

Panel gradings are for students grading to senior ranks (those going for ranks of 2nd Kyu, 1st Kyu and 1st Dan black belt). Assessments are conducted before a panel of black belts from multiple dojos and award of rank is certified by an instructor ranked 4th Dan or higher. Panel gradings were held in Perth in June and November, and in Kalgoorlie in September 2022.

At the June panel grading, Corey Parker successfully achieved the rank of 1st Dan black belt.

Kofukan inter-club tournament

On 6 November 2022, 100 competitors and their families descended on the Kwinana Recquatic Centre to compete in the annual Perth Kofukan Inter-club Tournament.

Competitors aged four to 40 competed in kumite, kata and team kata events. All eight Western Australian dojos were represented, including a contingent of 11 competitors and two referees from the Kofukan Karate Kalgoorlie club.

The inter-club tournament is a developing event, giving any student a chance to get on the tatami (mat) and give it a go. It also gives instructors and brown belts more experience in official roles like refereeing.

Kofukan Karate Australia also celebrated the 50th anniversary year of the beginning of Kofukan worldwide. To celebrate the occasion, a special cake was presented and every competitor received a cupcake in Kofukan colours. Don McKay, Chairperson, also read out a message from our International President, Shihan Keiji Tomiyama.



















WAKF tournaments

A small number of members have regularly competed in WA Karate Federation (WAKF) sanctioned tournaments, including Robert Sage (1st Dan, Kalgoorlie) who is also a member of the WAKF State Team. Robert represented WA at the 2022 National Championships, achieving a Bronze medal for Senior Male Team Kumite.

In mid-2022, Kofukan Karate Australia agreed to support and encourage more participation in WAKF tournaments. This led to the largest contingent of competitors for many years entering the Goju-Kai Open tournament on 11 September 2022, with 22 members (20 from Karate For Life and two from Kofukan Karate Kalgoorlie). For most it was their first open tournament!





Regional workshops in Kalgoorlie

On 20 February 2022, Kofukan Karate Kalgoorlie hosted the WAKF's Regional Seminar. This was an important part of the WAKF Board's approach to promoting karate in as many regions as possible. The WAKF included a focus for current and aspiring coaches and officials as part of the curriculum.

Kofukan Karate Kalgoorlie also hosted a weekend workshop on 24 and 25 September 2022. Instructors Don McKay and Lindon McKenna travelled to Kalgoorlie to assist Brian Chambers with the packed workshop schedule, which included sunrise training in the park and sessions on tournament kumite, selfdefence and partner work.



The weekend also included Anti-Bullying Workshops run by Don, which were open to non-members.





Movie night

Kofukan members, family and friends were invited to a Movie Night on Friday 30 September 2022 hosted by Karate For Life at the Baldivis Dojo. Guests were treated to pizza, unlimited popcorn, drinks, and chocolate and watched five episodes of Cobra Kai.



Beach training

On Sunday 11 December 2022, Karate For Life hosted a beach training and barbecue end of year windup which was open to all Kofukan members. Everyone enjoyed the sand, sub and surf with kihon (basics), grappling and throws. The event was also an opportunity for members to feature in a promotional video being produced by Good Sports as part of our prize for winning the Good Sports New Club of the Year (National) award.







Fundraising

August 2022 commenced a big fundraising drive for Kofukan Karate Australia led by Don McKay, Chairperson.

The purpose of the fundraising is to allow Kofukan Karate Australia to purchase protective equipment to enable members to participate in State competitions without the large cost outlay that comes with buying the required protective equipment. The fundraising also held subsidise entry fees. The first batch of 19 sets of protective equipment arrived on 29 August 2022 (pictured).

Fundraising in 2022 has included:

- Selling Cadbury Fundraising chocolates
- Members bringing their cans and bottles to the dojo or collecting them at home to be cashed in and recycled at Containers for Change collection points. In 2022, Karate For Life members deposited over 10,000 containers!

Donations and grants received in 2022 were:

- \$4,000 cash donation from Qube Logistics (Australia)
- \$1,030 cash donation from Diversus
- \$1,000 equipment and supplies vouchers from Melchor Contracting
- \$1,000 from the Alcohol and Drug Foundation for winning the Good Sport New Club of the Year (National) award
- \$24 in generous donations from young students bring their pocket money!

Kofukan Karate Australia thanks all donors plus members and their families who have put time and effort into fundraising, and of course our generous donors.

The management committee and instructors thank Don for his enormous efforts in driving the fundraising initiative.











Members

As at 31 December 2022, Kofukan Karate Australia had 354 members¹, of which 54 are ordinary (voting) members 16 years and over and 300 were junior members 15 years and under.

Incorporation

Kofukan Karate Australia Inc. (the Association) was incorporated on 17 December 2021. At this time, all members of affiliated clubs were transferred from the previous association, Shito-ryu Karate-do Kofukan International (Australia) Inc.

Meetings

As 2022 was the first year of the Association's operation, the Association held a committee meeting in January 2022 which was essentially in lieu of an Annual General Meeting (AGM) and was held to appoint the management committee. The first AGM will be held within 18 months of the Association's incorporation as required by section 50 of the *Associations Incorporation Act 2015*.

The Association is required by its Rules to hold four management committee meetings each year. The Association held five management committee meetings during 2022, in January, February, May, July and October. The management committee also met in February 2023.

All members who have achieved the rank of 1st Dan black belt or higher are automatically members of the Technical Committee, with voting rights held by members ranked 2nd Dan and higher.

The Rules require the Technical Committee to hold at least three meetings each year. In 2022, the Technical Committee met three times, in February, May and August.
